First Steps

Start with the SPEED Test

- SP (Strategic Plan) What is the plan? What is the who, what, where, when, why & how for your service or product?
- E (Evidence of Equity) Do you have any money, financing or financial backing to move your vision forward?
- E (Experience) Do you have any experience taking a business concept from the idea stage into the marketplace?
- D (Demand) Do you have any potential customers or buyers interested in your service or product?

Starting a Business in Iowa

Starting a business in Iowa involves several steps, including planning, completing legal requirements, and making major financial decisions. These 10 Steps, courtesy of the Small Business Administration will help you plan, prepare and manage your business. Additional information has been included in each step from Fayette County Economic Development and Tourism.

Step 1: Write a Business Plan

You wouldn't construct a building or a bridge without a plan, and the same holds true for your business. A business plan is essentially a blueprint or road map that provides detailed directions so a business can plan ahead for the future and avoid bumps in the road. Step 2: Get Business Assistance and Training

Take advantage of the many free resources and services available in Iowa that provide training, business counseling, help with preparing a business plan, securing financing, and expanding or relocating a business. Iowa Source Link is a great resource: <https://www.iasourcelink.com/>.

Step 3: Choose a Business Location

When starting or expanding a business, determining a location may be one of the most crucial decisions you make, as it requires detailed planning and research. You may also need to be aware of any local city requirements.

Step 4: Finance Your Business

Loans, personal savings, friends and family, are all options for financing a new or expanding business. There are many ways to obtain financial assistance in Iowa that are worth exploring and understanding. Be very cautious of opportunities for free financial assistance. There is no such thing as free grant money for business start-ups or expansions, so if it seems too good to be true! It probably is!

Step 5: Determine the Legal Structure of Your Business

When choosing the type of legal structure for your business, you will need to consider factors such as how you'll pay your taxes and how much personal liability exposure you will risk. Some of your options include sole proprietorship, partnership, Limited Liability Company (LLC), Corporation, S Corporation, Nonprofit or Cooperative. An LLC is best for the potential of expansion into other locations and protects the owner from personal liability.

Sole Proprietorship: Contact your local County Recorder.

LLC: Contact the Secretary of State at sos@sos.iowa.gov or 515-281-5204.

Step 6: Register a Business Name

All businesses in Iowa must register their business name if they don't intend to operate under their legal name. How you register depends on the way you legally structure the business. To be sure the business name you've chosen is not already in use in Iowa, do a name search in the Secretary of State Business Entities Search database.

Sole Proprietorship: Contact your local county recorder to file a 'Register a Trade Name' certificate. You cannot register as a sole proprietor with the Secretary of State.

Corporation, Limited Partnership, Limited Liability Company (LLC), Nonprofit, or Trade or Service Marks: Contact the Iowa Secretary of State.

Step 7: Get a Tax Identification Number

The federal Tax Identification Number for businesses is known as an Employer Identification Number (EIN). It is a unique number used to identify a business, much like a Social Security Number identifies an individual person. In most cases, businesses are required to obtain an EIN. Step 8: Register for State and Local Taxes

In addition to federal tax requirements, businesses will need to pay state and local taxes, which may vary from location to location. Contact the Iowa Department of Revenue at idr@iowa.gov or 515-281-3114.

Step 9: Obtain Business Licenses and Permits & Insurance

To legally run your business, there may be federal and state licenses you need to obtain. Iowa alone has over 440 different types of business licenses. Iowa does not, however, have the option to obtain a general business license.

Step 10: Understand Employer Responsibilities
